



The lemon is sour.






Pete tries a pickle.


It is long like a banana.

Pete tastes it.


"Better," Pete says,

Pete tries an orange. It has to be peeled like a banana. The orange is sweet, but it is too juicy. It makes Pete's paws sticky.




Pete tries fish, plums, rice, hot dogs, watermelon, and his mom's nut bread.

Pete wants a banana.


They're yummy and healthy.
