This was a new game for George.


He was curious.

three times.


Now it was George's turn.

A paper towel roll was his club.


He blew in one end.

The ball moved.


He was ready to play.

Instructions:

- 1. Make a golf club by taping a sponge to the bottom of a ruler.
- Draw pictures of your ideas for a golf course. Choose one you can build with materials you have.
- 3. Build your course (see ideas below) using the coffee can as the final hole.
- 4. Take turns with a friend playing your way through.
- 5. Talk about what's working and what's not. Do you need to change your design?

Ideas for your golf course:

- Make a tunnel by taping a paper towel roll on the floor.
- Put a chair or stool in the room for your ball to go under.
- Place paper plates on the floor to create obstacles for your ball to go around.
- Make a "sand trap" from a towel.
- Use two rows of building blocks to create a straight pathway.
- Come up with your own creative ideas!
